





# Steve Gallant, Leader East Suffolk Council







- £10k budget per Community Partnership in 2019/20, then £25k each year for 3 years
- Strategic funding pot of £150k in 2019/20 and then £300k each year for 3 years
- Almost £1.75 million investment in total over four years from New Homes Bonus plus £1.65 million in Enabling Communities Budgets
- Community Partnerships will meet at least quarterly from January 2020
- All eight CP Chairs will meet key strategic partners, including the Police, CCGs and SCC, together at quarterly Community Partnership Board meetings







#### Population Age breakdown


The age pyramid shows the age breakdown of the population of Framlingham, Wickham Market and villages CP against the national average








#### Children aged 0-15 income deprived






#### Deprivation Older people





Prevalence of dementia is higher than the national average among patients at both GP surgeries in the Framlingham, Wickham Market and villages Community Partnership area









#### IMD health deprivation and disability domain










#### Employment and education Benefit claimants
















- Connect for Health Social Prescribing Project
- Men's Shed, Hour Community and Worry Tree Café in Framlingham
- Potential Digital Care Home project at Mills Meadow, Framlingham
- 2018 Women's Tour Start in Framlingham June 2018 community involvement e.g. schools, Cycle Club, Mills Meadow (in Hour Community's rickshaw and disability bikes), FAYAP, One Life Suffolk
- FAYAP mentoring 19 young people supported to date
- Wickham Market Health and Wellbeing Hub
- Working with 5 rural communities to find transport solutions
- Peasenhall 'Meet Up Monday' project (with RCC and CAS)



### Framlingham, Wickham Market and villages Community Partnership - Headlines

- The most over-represented age group is 70-74 and the most under-represented is 30-34 29% are aged over 65, compared to 18% nationally
- 1,220 people (7.2%) are affected by income deprivation much lower than the Suffolk average of 10.1%
- None of the population lives in the 20% most deprived areas in England and only 17% live in the bottom 40%. There are different deprivation 'hotspots' overall, for children and for older people
- The life expectancy gap is 2.0 years for Males and 4.7 years for Females
- Prevalence of dementia is higher than national average amongst patients at both GP Practices but prevalence of depression is lower than the national average amongst patients at both GP Practices
- 22.4% of primary school children are overweight or obese, particularly in the rural eastern parts of the CP area
- 43.5% of Adults in the Community Partnership area do no exercise but 34.4% complete at least 2 hours a week the highest in East Suffolk
- There are a total of 25 Children in Care in the area
- There are social isolation hotspots in Yoxford and Wickham Market
- 2.2% of adults are in receipt of Universal Credit, with hotspots in Wickham Market, Framlingham and Yoxford
- All Primary Schools are outstanding or good but the number of children reaching the expected standard at KS2 was lower than the national average in 5 of the 7 schools
- 3,230 houses (44.0%) of all houses are in poor condition mainly in rural areas this is the highest in East Suffolk and 260 (3.15) of houses are hard to heat
- A significant proportion of the population have no access to a regular bus service 20.8% were more than 2 miles from a frequent bus service in 2017 the second highest of any CP area
- Recycling, water usage, excess packaging and climate change responses all above UK average but room for improvement, particularly in relation to making compromises to help the environment
