



Join in with the songs, solve the puzzles on the way, and try to make sure that the wonderful Magic Lamp does not fall into the wrong hands!


Seven actors play the range of characters in a show full of songs, live keyboard music, thrills, spills and fun!

NATURE NOTES

You may have heard that responsibility for management of The Mere is being returned from Suffolk Wildlife Trust to Framlingham College. The main reason for SWT's withdrawal is that they wish to concentrate their resources where they can make the biggest impact; in the grand scheme of things, The Mere is relatively small and somewhat isolated, although it obviously has connection with the River Ore running through it.

The change will take full effect next September and, in the meantime, SWT will work closely with the College to pass on advice and knowledge. The College have said that they will continue to protect The Mere's biodiversity and ensure that it continues to be a place of natural beauty for all to enjoy. They have thanked the SWT for their stewardship over the last 36 years. Perhaps it would also be appropriate to thank Ray and Wendy for all their efforts on the ground to keep things in good order.

If the old saying - "If ice in November will bear a duck, the winter will be all slush and muck" - still holds true (and it includes moorhens), it will turn out to be another mild and wet one. Writing this on the cusp of another named storm, that seems to be holding, so far.

The mild weather meant that I was still picking large (cabbage) white caterpillars off my vegetable plot well into November. Since then, the winter migrant birds have arrived; plenty of redwings and fieldfares, including one who has annexed our Bramley apple tree and its attendant windfalls, driving off any other thrushes that come within striking distance.

I have also seen a flock of seventy or so golden plover and a group (hardly enough to be a flock) of lapwing. The birds have also eaten all the berries off the holly tree in our front hedge, so we shan't be troubled with human thieves this year.

I think I forgot to wish you a merry Christmas last time, so will try to make amends with my best wishes for the new year. *Paul Collins*

Saturday January 3rd 1925

The pages now carry a number of ads regarding providing wireless sets- 'Opening the doors to music, song, speech and news hour after hour.'

The youthful wireless enthusiast would rather occupy himself listening in rather than poring over home lessons.!

Platelayers discovered a fir tree had fallen on the track this side of the 3rd level crossing. The tree was removed just in time before the outgoing train's arrival, thus avoiding a danger to life and possible serious damage to the train.

One arm and 3 fingers had to be amputated and her head had also been injured.

She is reported to be making satisfactory progress.

During these times it seemed Whist Drives/Dances were almost the sole means of raising funds for all the clubs and societies and worthy causes in the town.

The Choir and churchwardens were joined by Mr Wright the organist and Mr Mayhew, the Clerk and entertained to supper at The Rectory on Monday by kind invitation of the Rector and Mrs Lancaster.

The sumptuous repast was followed by games, songs etc and a most enjoyable evening was spent.

Saturday 17th January 1925 continued

It seemed that interesting local news was very sparse, as in this issue the news consisted of a report of a resident in Station Road tripping whilst carrying a glass jar indoors and cutting her hand and Sidney Adams skidding on his bicycle in Bridge Street and colliding with a car-resulting in minor injuries.

YET ANTHER WHIST DRIVE & DANCE - in St Michael's Rooms - this time in aid of the Cricket Club. A common amusement at this time being a competition to guess the number of peas in a jar - won by E. Banthorpe.

AVOICE FROM ABROAD

Miss Clow of Castle Street received an interesting letter from her cousin, Mr David Clow, in Peterboro, Canada where he emigrated to over 50 years ago He is currently apple farming.

OBIT:- Mrs Coleman in her 89th year - yet another instance of the remarkable ages reached by most Framlingham people.

JUVENILE FESTIVITY

the Annual New Year Party for Church Sunday School and those attending the afternoon service in St Michael's Church was held on Thursday evening. It started off in the Assembly Hall with entertainment by conjurer Sidney Buck from Ipswich; followed by a sumptuous repast in St Michael's Rooms - then back to the Assembly Hall for an entertainment by the boys of the day school.

Father Christmas arrived laden with toys he distributed to each child, all of whom were given an orange at departure.

SUFFOLK FARM WORKERS MINIMUM WAGE - A Substantial Increase.

Orders were issued by the Agricultural Wages Board to come into effect January 26th.

7d an hour for a guaranteed week of 50 hours in summer [1st March to last Monday in October] and 48 hours in the winter.

Horsemen, Stockmen and Shepherds an additional weekly sum of 6/- to cover duties in connection with the care of animals. Overtime rate 9d an hour.

Saturday 31st January 1925

CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH

The Winter Treat was held in the Forester's Hall on Thursday evening. A bountiful tea was followed by games and other amusements.

A great surprise was the appearance of 2 fairies complete with wings, wands and other adornments who distributed presents to all. At 10'o clock the happy gathering came to a close. Very little local news in this issue.

Saturday February 7th 1925

FRAMLINGHAM

The Whist Drive in the Assembly Hall this week was to raise funds for the summer outing for the Church Sunday School Scholars. The evening concluded with 2 hours of dancing.

CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH

Funds are required for a new organ, the next event being 'Through Syria with a Camera' with the Rev T.J.Hosken on



Wednesday at 7pm.

VILLAGE NEWS - SAXTEAD

The Chapel was now being used as a Parish Hall. The opening event was a concert last Wednesday comprised of comic songs and Suffolk patter from H. E. Peck, pianoforte solos, and singing.

On Friday evening there was a Whist Drive under the auspices of the Women's Conservative Association.

TRAGIC MIDNIGHT DISCOVERY AT DENNINGTON

Walter Ford, a farmer aged 46 was found drowned in a pond on the farm. He followed his usual custom that evening of tea with his family, and then reading the newspaper, and he seemed much as normal.

He left no communication regarding his final act.

OUR MEMBER

Lord Huntingfield, our exceedingly popular member of Parliament, has broken his leg whilst tobogganing during his visit to America. He writes that it has put a very severe dampener on his trip.

Saturday 7th February 1925 continued...

MONDAY'S GREAT GALE Extensive Damage

Framlingham and District experienced a very destructive gale last Monday night. By the morning every road and path in the town was littered with parts of roofs and other debris. Hardly a farmstack escaped from having the roofs torn away.

Electric wires in the town were being forced into contact emitting bright sparks. This side of Broadwater one of Mr Wakelyn's huge elms was uprooted, and fell across the road and blocked it for several hours.

February 14th issue is missing from the archive.

Saturday February 21st 1925

The Eye Division Women's Conservative Association organised a series of Whist Drives; the qualifying event in the Assembly Hall attracted 252 players - which is almost a record for the town!

SERIOUS ACCIDENT ON MONDAY

Army pensioner Frank Stannard was knocked down by a motorcyclist named Fox [a butler at Brandeston Hall] as he crossed the road outside the White Horse Inn.

He sustained severe injuries to his head and face. The motorcylists' view was obstructed by a stationary bus.

FRAMLINGHAM LIVESTOCK ASSOCIATION

The Annual General Meeting was held at The Crown on Saturday. The accounts showed an increased surplus from £67 to £72. The date of the next show will be on Thursday July 16th.

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FRAMLINGHAM - SUDDEN DEATH Mrs Harriet Dickerson, of Albert Place, suddenly passed at midnight on Sunday. Though advancing in years [63], she was in her usual good health up to Saturday. the following day she felt ill and was medically attended. The illness was not thought to be serious and death was quite unexpected.

Many column inches were devoted to a long article on 'Why Do Dogs Bark'.

It was announced Lord And Lady Huntingfield had temporarily closed Heveningham Hall whist they sojourned in Cadogan Square, Chelsea until May so that his Lordship could attend to his Parliamentary duties.

Vans are used for the deer safaris on which you may also see sparrow hawks, red head partridges, kestrels, buzzards and stone curlews. With red deer there are stags and hinds.

The stags' antlers have points which increase in number as they age, 12 points make a Royal, 14 points make an Imperial and 16 points make a Monarch.

Our thanks to Steve for a truly fascinating afternoon.

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

Update as at December 2024

Welcome

We would like to welcome to the practice. Harriet Trainee Dispenser

Patient Participation Group (PPG)

Thank-you to those who completed the survey. This ran during October 2024 and has provided helpful patient insight to the surgery. Very briefly:

- An impressive 568 people completed responses. Most of these were completed by those attending Framlingham Surgery, with a minority via Survey Monkey online.
- The main method of arranging medical appointments with the Surgery is via phone or in person, at present.
- There is an opportunity to use digital means of communication, such as the NHS App, particularly for repeat prescriptions. This may be easier and quicker for patients than more traditional methods, providing that you use a smart phone. If you do, there is access to free NHS WiFi at the Surgery.
- From January 2025, we intend to promote use of the NHS App and provide help to set it up.
- The surgery now has a better insight into the methods of communication preferred by patients. This will inform improvements to communications from the surgery, particularly with regards to appointment provisions.
- There is room for improvements in the way the Surgery communicates with patients.
- There was interest from 77% of you to in participating in future surveys. This is very encouraging, as we aim to represent the views of as wide a group of patients as possible. Your help has been much appreciated.

Our next PPG meeting is scheduled for Thursday 23rd January at 12.30pm, Framlingham Surgery. Repeat Medication Requests Advanced Notice

From 1st April 2025 Framlingham Medical Practice will NOT be accepting repeat medication requests by email. You can order your medication by the white repeat medication slip, SystmOnline and the NHS App.

Online Consultations Advanced Notice

April 2024 the government were planning to roll out new Online Consultation software for GP surgeries. This was delayed and ICB's were commissioned to support the new online consultation software rolled out in early 2025. The practice will be moving away from the eConsult request form and are moving to the Anima request platform. In order to use Anima patients will need to create a unique account. We will put out updates on Anima closer to the new software roll out.

POLITE NOTICE - Parking at Framlingham and Earl Soham Surgeries

Please can we ask patients who park in either Pembroke Road or Earl Soham Surgery, whilst visiting the practice to park considerately? Please ensure you do not park over or block our neighbour's driveways. Thank you very much.

Medical Students

Thank you to all the patients who have been consulted by our medical students in 2024. Your support allows them to develop their clinical skills. We will be welcoming more medical students during 2025. Please continue to support the students and help us to train them in general practice.

GP Training afternoons

In order for our GP's to stay clinically current and up to date the Integrated Care Board (ICB) provides a training afternoon a month. The next training afternoon will be Wednesday 12th February 2025. There will be no doctors or nurses on site from 1pm. The practice will be open for dispensary and face to face reception requests.

Research

The Practice has now been approved to undertake research projects. We now have our first research project underway. If you do not want to be contacted to take part in any research projects please let the practice know.

GREEN FINGERS TIPS

JANUARY

Prune apple and pear trees removing dead, damaged or diseased growth and aim to reduce canopy by 10 - 20%. Visit rhs.org.uk

for 'an easy guide to pruning'.

Prune gooseberies and redcurrants cutting side shoots to 3 buds from their base.

Remove about a quarter of old stems form established blackcurrant bushes.

Plan your veg growing in front of the fire for the coming season.

Cut off hellebore leaves at the base to discourage blackspot disease and show off the emerging flowers.

FEBRUARY

Chit potatoes - lay out tubers in a light frost-free place. Prune winter flowering shrubs that have finished flowering such as mahonia, winter jasmine, heathers.

Divide bulbs such as snowdrops and replant 'in the green'.

Prune wisteria side shoots to 3 buds from the base.

Renovate overgrown hedges with some pruning.

Prune conservatory climbers such as bougainvillea.

Prune buddleia and elder.

Cut back overwintered hardy fuchsia

Mulch beds with garden compost.

A good time to move deciduous shrubs

if they are in the wrong place.

WILDLIFE IN THE GARDEN Centipedes & Millipedes

Of the class of myriapods - which is Greek for 10,000 feet!

Centipede is Latin for 100 feet. Centipedes have a single pair of legs per segment so are quite nimble, compared to millipedes [Latin for a 1,000 feet], with 2 pairs of legs per segment.

They are carnivorous predators and their 1st pair of legs are re-modelled as piercing fangs to inject venom into their prey. They lurk mainly out of sight in the garden

Millipedes are mainly vegetarian and prefer to feed on rotting vegetation, grass clippings, decaying wood etc.

Centipedes munch on insects and invertebrates, such as spiders, slugs, worms, flies, woodlice. They do not breed by direct bodily contact like millipedes, but just leave sperm on the ground, which the female is then expected to pick up. The young hatch from eggs and take 2 or 3 years shedding skins and growing more legs until mature. Their usual life span is 5 to 6 years. Millipedes live for 7 - 10 years.

There are nearly 50 species of centipedes recorded in the UK and they are in the food chain for shrews, toads, badgers and birds. **SB**

A New Year Greeting to you all!

With flooding and extreme weather, climate change factors are becoming more obvious in Framlingham.

Over 70% of us have gas central heating, which is a fossil fuel planned to be phased out in 10 years.

Global supply problems result in higher bills. Data shows that per household we have a higher carbon footprint than our larger neighbours.

Part of that is due to our inefficient housing, and our high need for using cars to get around. As an agricultural, rural community we also need to improve our local biodiversity.

All these issues need addressing and in the New Year we have three projects planned so far:

- In January on the 25th we will have a stall on the Market Hill. We will be giving away 'Homes for Nature' bird boxes and wild flower seeds for bees.
- In February we launch 'Keep the Heat Fram'. We are looking for home owners to put their house forward to have thermal images taken free.

- In March we start the second phase of 'Splash of Colour'. A team will be sowing wild flower seeds and planting bulbs on green sites around the town where we have obtained permission from landowners.

If you have ideas for possible projects please tell us, or better still join us, because together we can take action to create positive change.



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



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Changing Rooms

I have always been interested in buildings, and particularly in changes of methods and customs of construction. What does strike me is the change in names of rooms that has occurred over the years. I grew up in a council house in Farnham, my mum and dad moved into it when it was new in 1947. Dad always called the kitchen a scullery. The lounge was a sitting room, and the spare downstairs room was the front room. The unplumbed toilet was always called the lav. The bathroom didn't have another name as there wasn't one! There was an integral storage room outside that was called the shod. In my younger days as an apprentice plumber I would often go to farm houses with a Backus (Back House), this was a room off the main kitchen where food was stored and kindling chopped etc. The person who worked in this room was called the Backus boy, and he was used for all the menial tasks in the house. At secondary school we where taught this Suffolk dialect poem:-

Thass seventy year come harvest time, since I fust went to wark, and tarned my hand to everything from arly morn to dark, an went bardsnestin in the spring when all the holls were green, an in the nuttery look to find hay jack and titty wren. When I was a backus boy.

King harrys allus used to build in a grut owd hulver tree, an if no eggs were in the nest "thass fit for an egg" say we, them mavishes and fulfers tew would sing a luvily tune an that owd cuckoo, he'd begin a huckerin come June. When I was a backus boy.

The hornpipes flew quaverin round when I went down the fen for kindling, but them vipers there they wholly scared me then, come winter time there'd be throshin days an I'd kill rats an meese till missus used to holler "boy ha you shet up them geese". When I was a backus boy.

When barley in the barn they'd stack I used to ride the goof, round an round, my hoss an I until we reach the roof, an then the men would make a slip In the corn agin the side an push and shuff owd smiler in, plump to the ground he'd slide. When I was a backus boy.

An when my hans were blue wi cowd an my close were drippen wet, our missus she would ax me in, an by the fire Γd set ter git my wittles in the warm a rare good hearted one. An sometimes bakin days she'd say "catch Johny, there's a bun". When I was a backus boy.



With local fresh fruit scarce try this alternative.

Winter fruit salad

<u>Ingredients:</u> 600g ready to eat dried fruit; 3 tbsp clear honey

1 vanilla pod split lengthways or 1tsp of vanilla extract

1 Earl Grey tea bag: 1 tbsp fresh lemon juice mascarpone or Greek yogurt to serve Method:-

Tip the fruits and 700ml cold water into a large saucepan. Add the honey and vanilla. Bring to the boil. Stir well, lower the heat and simmer for 10minutes until slightly syrupy. Take the pan off the heat and stir in the tea bag. Leave to infuse for 10 minutes. Discard the tea bag and vanilla pod (if used), tip the fruits into a nonmetallic bowl and pour over the lemon juice. Stir, then leave to cool. Cover and chill until ready to serve with mascarpone or Greek yoghurt.

2024 - A BRIEF RETROSPECT

The main event of 2023, Storm Babet on the 20th October cast long shadows over this year.

As I write, there are still people not yet back in their homes. The United Free Church Hall didn't re-open until November 23rd. So The Horticultural Society was grateful to The Railway Inn for hosting their 3 shows during this year.

On 31st January Bradlaugh Electrical closed after 43 years of serving the town's electrical needs in Fore Street. Their premises was then occupied by Susan Whymark Funeral Directors following their merger with Moore's Funeral Services.

Cross Ram & Co became Atkins Dellow in Church Street.

On July 1st Toby's Pet Shop moved into much larger premises at Charnwood Industrial estate following the closure of Scarlett & Mustard.

Their vacated Bridge Street premises was then swiftly moved into by the Majestic Hares who left Carleys Yard. Carleys Yard then became a holiday let.

The Two Magpies opened a bakery and café in the old Barclays Bank premises.

Indacottage moved from Queens Head Alley to the ex-Christian Science church reading room in Fore Street in December, which had formerly been a saddlers in the 1920's.

At Christmas Sarah Cole will have closed the retail side of her Jewellery Studio in The Mews, but will continue to offer repairs, alterations and special commissions.

Sadly, The Cake Bench, after 2.5 successful years on Market Hill, will be closing by the end of the year.



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
